Girls Inc. Center at Berry

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The Girls Inc. Outreach Program at Berry Elementary School offers girls the opportunity to be involved in our Girls Inc. National Identity Programs and also gives them opportunities to be active in other activities that help them develop holistically as a girl.

Girls Inc. Leaders in Action

The Leaders in Action Club worked hard this year to make changes in their school and communities. Participants from the Leaders in Action Club at Berry Elementary and the Community Youth Development program teamed up to tackle community needs in Arlington and Fort Worth. Participants learned effective communication skills, project planning and organization, and how to enhance literary skills and leadership qualities.



Girls Learn Value of Giving Back

Members of the Leaders in Action Club participated in SLANT 45, a program supported by the North Texas Superbowl Committee, which was an initiative to raise awareness of the work done by nonprofits in the community. The group planned and implemented a service project that resulted in their cleaning up the school park so kids in the community have a clean park to play in after school and on the weekends. The group attended the celebration concert where they sat in the front row and celebrated their successes with Jordyn Sparks and other celebrities!

Unleash Heart

Unleash HeART is a non-profit project developed by Tara Brown, an area art instructor. Unleash HeART's mission is dedicated to encouraging personal growth, self awareness, communication skills, and a sense of individuality in children and adolescents through creative art education and experiences. During 2010, Tara volunteered at Berry and taught our girls about art history and biographical information on artists such as Roy Lichtenstein and Georgia O'Keefe. Girls



had the opportunity to try replicating some of the famous art they studied. The program gave the girls a chance to learn how to better express themselves through the medium of art.

GirlPower! Hour

GirlPower! hour is held every day from 5-6 p.m. during the after school program. The girls participate in a number of programs including art projects, dance, scrapbooking, sports and our National Identity Programs.

Young Women's Leadership Academy

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Girls Inc. of Tarrant County is thrilled to partner with the Young Women's Leadership Academy, the new all-girl school in Fort Worth. The school opened in fall 2010, serving 150 sixth and seventh grade girls. We provided our Girls Beyond Bullying program, which gave girls the chance to gain the knowledge, skills, and confidence to stand up to, and prevent bullying and peer aggression.

This 13-week program covered several important topics in the area of bullying. The girls learned about team-building, self-esteem, being a true friend, what a bully is, different types of bullying including cyber bullying and gossip, and how to cope with anger. The girls at the Young Women's Leadership Academy learned that when others are being hurt, it is not acceptable to stay silent. Each student was encouraged during the program to step up and make a difference by actively taking her part in resisting bullying behavior.

Girls Inc. of Tarrant County is excited to continue our partnership with the Academy, and we look forward to offering more of our nationally-researched programs to the students!



Our Programs

Girls Inc. of Tarrant County is proud to offer community based prevention and enrichment programs to schools, churches, community centers, and libraries across Tarrant County. All of our programs are based on nationally researched curriculum and offer age-appropriate sessions for girls ages 5 to 18. Our national identity programs include:

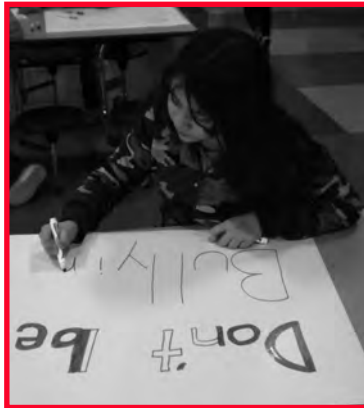


GirlPower!

The GirlPower! program works to provide young ladies with necessary information about self-esteem, healthy relationships, reproductive health and sexual education with an emphasis on abstinence. In 2010, 177 girls participated in the GirlPower! program throughout Tarrant County.

Girls Beyond Bullying

Studies show that physical and non-physical forms of aggression are harmful to a student's ability to learn, grow, and succeed. Girls Beyond Bullying was developed in 2009 in response to community demand for a female-specific program to address bullying and relational aggression between girls. This program provides girls with the necessary skills to shape healthy peer relationships. More than 180 girls participated in the Girls Beyond Bullying program.



Economic Literacy

Economic Literacy introduces girls as young as six to basic financial concepts, including money management and investments. The program explores how money affects us locally and globally as it fosters development of the skills needed to be financially self-sufficient. The program also gives girls the opportunity to discuss equal pay for equal work, child-care, welfare, and other issues that particularly affect women and girls.

My Girlfriend Zelda

My Girlfriend Zelda introduces girls ages 8-11 to basic anatomy and physiology and is designed to help girls learn about their bodies. The program also acquaints girls with some of the roles and responsibilities of healthcare professionals. More than 70 girls participated in My Girlfriend Zelda in 2010.



Media Literacy

Girls Inc. developed Media Literacy to address the wider media consumption of girls and young women beyond television. This program helps girls develop critical thinking skills they need to wade through the myriad of media messages they encounter. More than 130 girls participated in Media Literacy in 2010.

Friendly PEERSuasion

The number of teens in grades 9-12 who used alcohol grew to 39 percent in 2009. In the past year, the use of ecstasy increased 67 percent, and 25 percent of teens said they smoked pot. In response to the increase of substance use among youth, Girls Inc. of Tarrant County works with girls across the county to encourage them to make good decisions and resist negative peer pressure. In 2010, more than 300 girls participated in the Friendly PEERSuasion program. This program teaches girls how to cope with stress, build self-esteem, resist negative peer pressure, and gain knowledge about how substance use affects the body. This award-winning program was created by our agency in the 1970s and is now used by Girls Inc. affiliates across the United States and Canada.



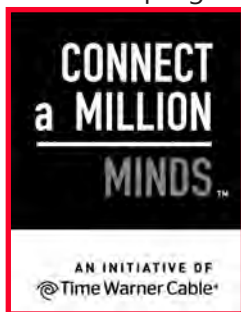

Operation SMART Summer Camp

In 2010, Girls Inc. of Tarrant County launched our first Operation SMART Summer Camps and they were a huge success! Operation SMART (Science, Math, and Relevant Technology) is a program geared toward changing girls' attitudes about science, math, and technology, as well as their roles as females in predominately male-oriented careers. During the summer, the girls explored the world of engineering and the science of chemistry, botany, and biology. The girls also focused on team-building activities, which increased interaction among camp members, built relationships, enhanced communication skills, and taught the girls to practice working together.



Time Warner Cable partnered with us to sponsor one week of SMART Camp and facilitated programs using the Connect-A-Million Minds (CAMM) curriculum.



CAMM was created to address the declining interest of youth in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math by connecting students to out-of-school learning opportunities in their community. Studies show that 80 percent of jobs created in the next decade will require math and science skills; however, women receive less than 28 percent of the computer science bachelor's degrees. During this week, the girls participated in fun, yet educational experiences featuring the program, "Cracking the Codes in the Digital World," where they learned the science behind cable. The girls also spent the day at Six Flags Over Texas, and they received a private tour with a park engineer, learning the science behind roller coasters.

Community Youth Development

The Girls Inc. Community Youth Development Program served 116 girls in 2010, an increase in attendance of 85 percent from 2009. Retention and recruitment numbers also increased with more people inquiring about our programs on the Northside of Fort Worth. In addition to learning Girls Inc. curricula, CYD program participants also have the opportunity to participate in community service projects, speaking engagements, poetry workshops, book clubs, tutoring, field trips and more! The 2009 Smart Girl award, our annual scholarship, was awarded to Erika Garcia, a participant in the CYD program who is now attending college and pursuing a degree in architecture.



Girls Rock the House

Susana Victor, an 8th grader at Stripling Middle School, headed to Washington, D.C. to present her congressional bill on improving conditions for children in foster care. Susana competed along with two other groups in Girls Rock the House (GRTH), a national initiative for 8th grade girls in political districts represented by women of the House of Representatives, featuring a six-week curriculum that inspired girls to envision their roles in the political process. Girls Inc. of Tarrant County oversaw the two groups from White Settlement ISD and Fort Worth ISD, and worked with the girls in a hands-on learning experience to create their bills. Susana's bill focused on improving conditions for foster care children such as better screening of foster families and better management of case loads for caseworkers. Susana met with House Representatives and participated in a recognition dinner with winners from throughout the United States.

TCU Sports Clinics

In celebration of National Girls & Women in Sports Day, Girls Inc. of Tarrant County partnered with Texas Christian University and hosted a free sports clinic for girls ages 5 to 18 in February 2010. More than 150 girls attended the clinic held at the Ed & Rae Schollmaier Basketball Complex on the TCU campus. Athletes from TCU Athletics showed the girls basic skills and demonstrations in a variety of sports including volleyball, soccer, equestrian and more. After the clinic, girls attended the TCU vs. Air Force women's basketball game!

National Girls & Women in Sports Day inspires girls to recognize and celebrate the accomplishments of women athletes who make a difference by overcoming difficult circumstances, breaking records and making anything possible. TCU also presented Girls Inc. with a \$500 donation from the NCAA for the Pack the House Contest for our participation in the event.

12th Annual Sister to Sister Summit

More than 130 girls participated in the Girls Inc. Sister 2 Sister Summit held on April 24, 2010 at the Arlington ISD Professional Development Center. The theme, *Live Smart: Be the Girl You Were Meant to Be*, focused on our Economic Literacy program. The girls learned the basics of money including opening a checking account, earning your own income, and becoming an entrepreneur. They participated in games, social activities and group discussions to enhance their financial competence and confidence. The program helps girls recognize they can have control over their financial futures.

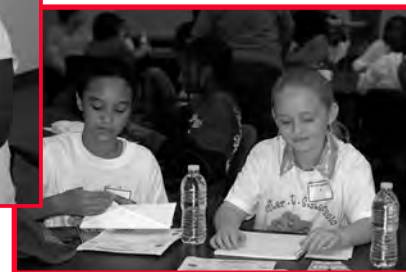

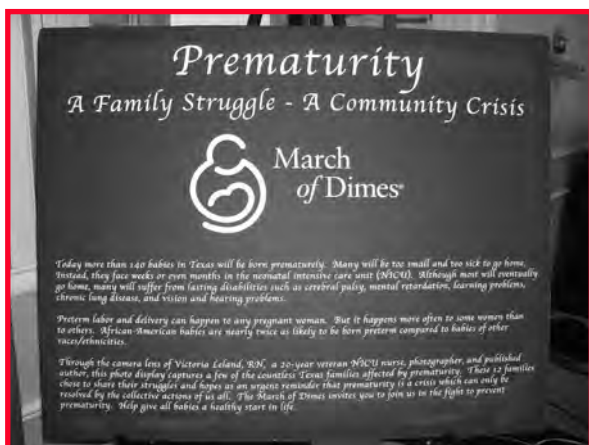
Hattitude Expression Night

More than 50 girls participated in the Hattitude Girl's Expression Night to celebrate Women's History Month. Girls from our CYD program read original poetry focused on the what it's like to be a girl, being respected for their minds instead of their bodies, and facing adversity as a girl or woman. Seventeen girls from Berry performed an original dance routine. Hattitude began at the Fort Worth Public Library in 2001. Organizations across the area created a partnership to celebrate the contributions of women and to raise awareness about issues related to women and girls. Each year, Hattitude hosts innovative programs, special events and activities to celebrate women and the contributions they have made to society.



Real Talk for Real Girls

The Real Talk for Real Girls Mother/Daughter Summit was developed in 2009 in partnership with the March of Dimes - Fort Worth Division to raise awareness of the issue of premature births. The event focuses on strengthening communication between mothers and daughters to help the girls feel empowered to make healthy life decisions. The mothers and daughters who attended the summit participated in many activities including creating vision boards, goal-setting, career exploration, and creating common visions and goals. The event is held each year in November in observance of Prematurity Awareness Month. In 2010, 16 mothers and 15 daughters attended the summit held at World Missionary Baptist Church in Fort Worth.

Girls Inc. of Tarrant County and the Association of Image Consultants International (AICI) hosted the ABC's of Image, a seminar focused on appearance, behavior and communication for girls ages 11 to 18. The seminar was held on March 6 at the Arlington ISD Professional Development Center, and more than 75 girls attended.

The event helped give girls the skills they need to become successful, strong, smart, and bold young ladies. The seminar also helped the girls gain confidence and skills they can use in everyday life.



AICI is a non-profit organization that counsels both individuals and corporate clients on appearance, behavior, communication skills, etiquette and international protocol. AICI teaches girls how to achieve their goals with authenticity, credibility and confidence.

Girls Inc. Annual Garage Sale Fundraiser

Girls Inc. hosted our first garage sale fundraiser in October 2010 with great success! Amy Rasor, Volunteer Coordinator, had people on-hand to help with set up, running the sale and cleaning up. Volunteering with Girls Inc.

The Volunteer Coordinator position was created in 2010 due to the increase in volunteer requests for our agency. The coordinator recruits, organizes, retains, and recognizes individuals interested in donating their time to our mission.



People volunteer with us for a number of reasons, but one thing is always present - they are passionate about helping others in their community and know the importance of giving back.

In 2010, 173 volunteers served 6,644 hours for a value of \$138,532. Of the 173 volunteers, 107 were community volunteers helping with various agency needs, 31 were service learning students serving with the agency to learn more about helping people in the community, 24 were interns completing upper-level coursework to become social workers, and 11 were board members dedicated to the overall success of the agency.

Community volunteers served 799 hours working with girls in our programs, working at special events, helping out at the office, and many other duties. Service Learning volunteers served 599 hours working mostly with girls in our programs after school and serving an average of 15-25 hours per volunteer. Melissa Oden, Vice President of Program Development, coordinates our internship program and trains these individuals on the implementation and impact of our programs. In 2010, intern hours totaled 5,136. This gave the agency the ability to reach more girls in more locations throughout Tarrant County. Melissa's recruitment and training of these individuals helped contribute \$107,090 to the total value of hours served in 2010. In addition, our 11 board members served

a total of 110 hours. This service and support allows the agency to continue to grow through increased awareness in the community.

We averaged two special events per month in 2010, which made it even more important to develop the volunteer department within our agency. By using volunteers, the staff members are able to dedicate more time to reaching more people in the community. We used volunteers for more than 20 different agency needs and events including working with youth, working at fundraisers, assisting with office duties and special projects, and much more.

Girls Inc. Internship Program

Girls Inc. offers numerous internship experiences for students studying public health, social work, and counseling. Each semester, Girls Inc. provides practical field experience for interns. Each intern class is a mix of Master of Public Health, Social Work, and Counseling students from various colleges. Regardless of the academic discipline of the students, Girls Inc. offers comprehensive training to each of them based on their learning needs.

The internship program continued to grow in 2010 with a total of 26 interns participating in the program. Students from the University of Texas at Arlington, the University of North Texas Health Science Center at Fort Worth School of Public Health, Tarrant County College, and Texas Wesleyan University participated in the program. Interns in 2010 represented the fields of social work, public health, and counseling at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. The students connect theory learned in the classroom to real-world practice in an effort to create competent, confident service practitioners.

Tarrant County Kids



Tarrant County Kids, our before and after school childcare division, serves boys and girls ages 5-12 at nine schools in Arlington ISD and at Adventure Camp during the summer break and most school holidays.



The trained childcare staff ensure that programs are fun and interactive. During Adventure Camp, field trips are held each week at local cultural, sports, and recreational facilities. Adventures begin and end at a convenient Arlington location.

Our childcare program helps children develop social skills and programs are focused on academic achievement, TAKS tutoring, reading and more. Children take pre- and post-tests to measure the levels of cooperation, assertion and self-control. Results of these tests were reported to the parents of the children in our program. The results are used to develop activities within the program to help develop social skills. They are also shared with our Board of Directors and other stakeholders including schools we serve to show the need for effectiveness of children's programs.

Thirty-six percent of the students served in our childcare program receive financial assistance from our agency. Dallas Food & Nutrition continued to provide healthy, nutritious snacks and juice to the children in the five Title I schools we serve.

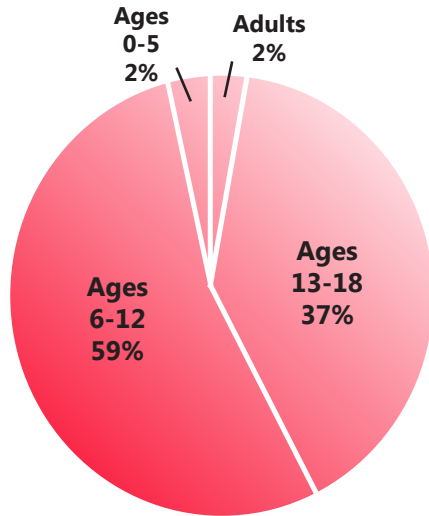

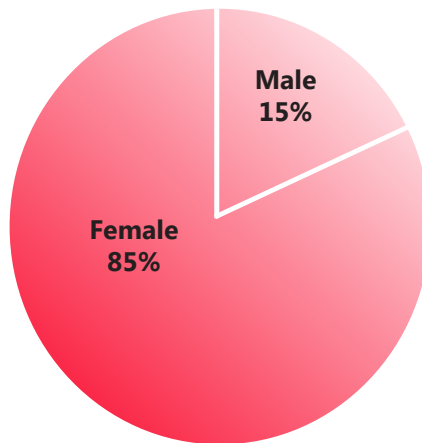

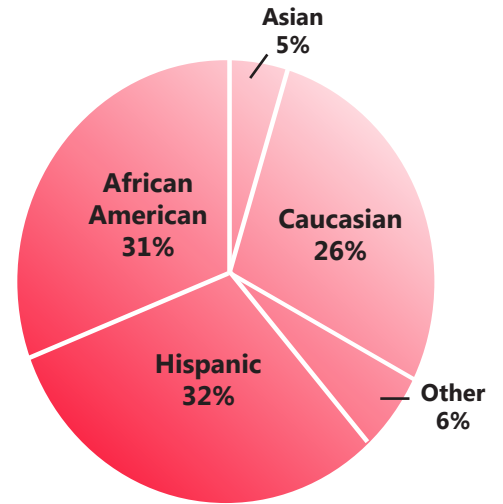
Clients by Age

Clients by Race

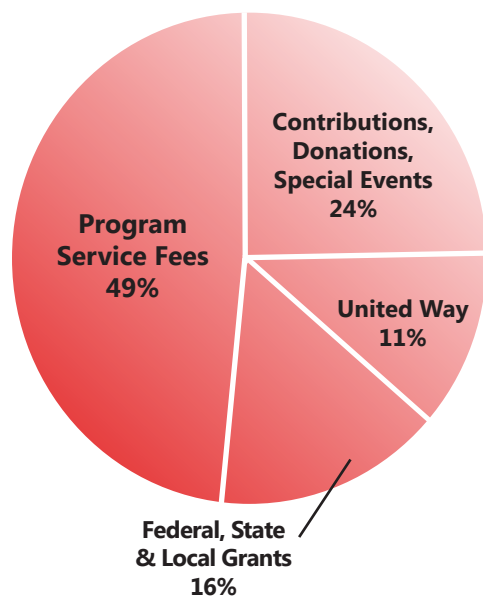

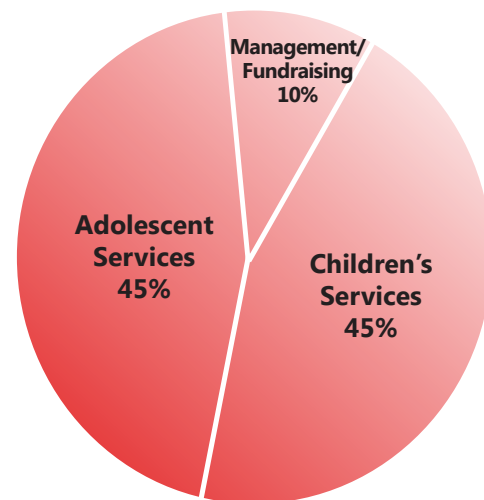

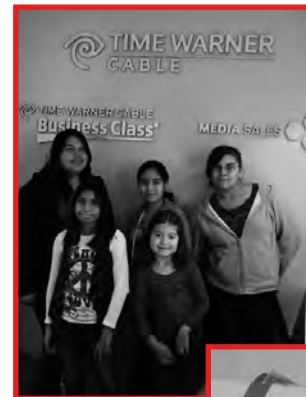
